When was Saul Converted? On the Road to Damascus or When He Received His Sight?

When was Saul of Tarsus converted? Was it on the Road to Damascus or was it when he received his sight after his three days of blindness? There are several clues in the three accounts of his conversion in Acts 9:3-18; 22:6-16; and 26:12-18. Evidence can be found for both positions.

2-18. Evidence can be found for bot
Acts 9
As he [Paul] was traveling,
it happened that
he was approaching Damascus,
and suddenly a light
from heaven
flashed around him;
and he fell
to the ground and
heard a voice saying to him,
"Saul, Saul,

An Argument for Saul's Conversion on the Road to Damascus

Ananias immediately addressed him as "Brother Saul" (Acts 9:17 and 22:13)

Arguments for Saul's Conversion After His Three Days of Blindness¹

Conversion is defined as the opening of eyes and turning from darkness to light by Paul in Acts 26:18 in the context of his description of his own blindness and then receiving sight in his own conversion (Acts 9:9-17). His being filled with the Spirit is specially linked to his receiving his sight in Acts 9:18.

Ananias links his baptism to the washing away of his sins, as if they were not washed away until his public oath ritual of baptism (Acts 22:16). Paul apparently links the forgiveness of sins that he preached in the context of his own conversion and the washing away of his sins

It was at Saul's baptism that he called on the name of the Lord (Acts 22:16), the initial act of faith by which he received forgiveness (Acts 26:18).
